### Marine Bootcamp

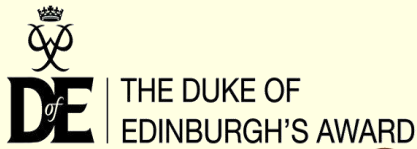


The College was very excited to be able to offer our students in Years 7-13 the opportunity to take part in a military style fitness class in early June which involved team work, communication and determination.

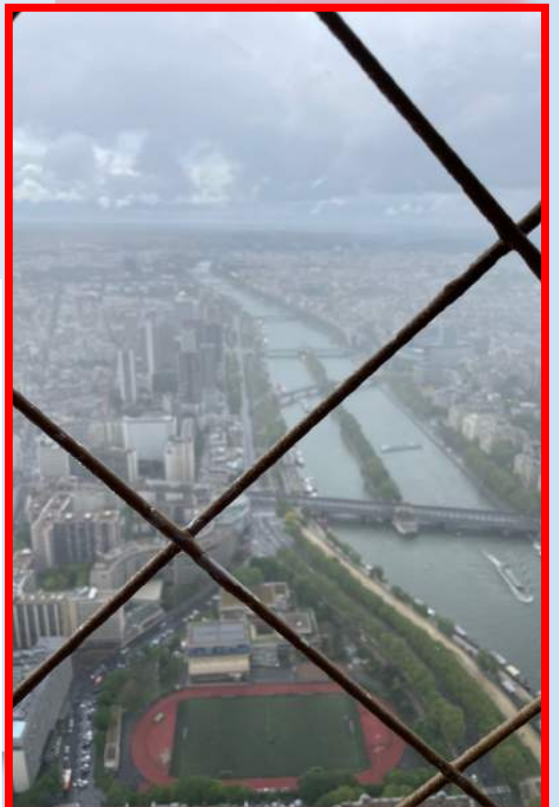
# Paris Trip

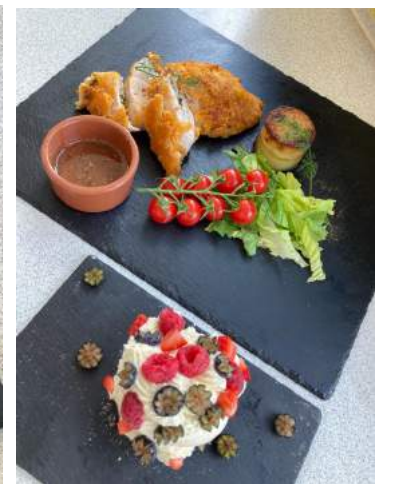


# FOOD & NUTRITION

*amino acids and reducing sugars that gives browned food its distinctive flavour*).

After all that hard work students enjoyed the fruits of, they labour and ate their cooked breakfasts but not before taking photos to help with their revision.



A group of 30 Year 10 students signed up to attend taster sessions at Bicton College on 20<sup>th</sup> June. Our students signed up to a range of activities including animal management, equine studies, land-based engineering and arboriculture, amongst other things. ## HCC took part in the Annual Ted Wragg Innovation Competition at the Exeter College

The Innovation Competition seeks to discover students who demonstrate an aptitude to solve complex problems in innovative ways. The competition required students to research, investigate and create an innovative solution to one of these problems. The teams' ideas needed to be about using technology to make the world a better place.

The team could choose between two projects, either a sustainable airport full of innovative cutting-edge ideas and with the opportunity for a model or a sustainable school full of cutting-edge ideas and smart materials.

The Honiton team chose the latter, with the school being re-sited to the river Otter to use the constant flow of water for a water wheel powering turbines.

Further ideas included smart glass for keeping the school cool on warm days and warm on cold days, other cutting-edge materials would be employed, from algae to frozen Co2 (as insulation), pollution absorbing paint and kinetic energy walkways.



Each team presented for 5 minutes in front of a prestigious judging team and then faced questions, added to that the Honiton team were the very last team to stand up and present, (approx. 3.5 hours of watching others).

After a half hour of judging, the winners were announced and Honiton won with only 2 points separating the top three teams, Honiton scored 143.5 out of a possible 150 points.

## WHAT'S INVOLVED?

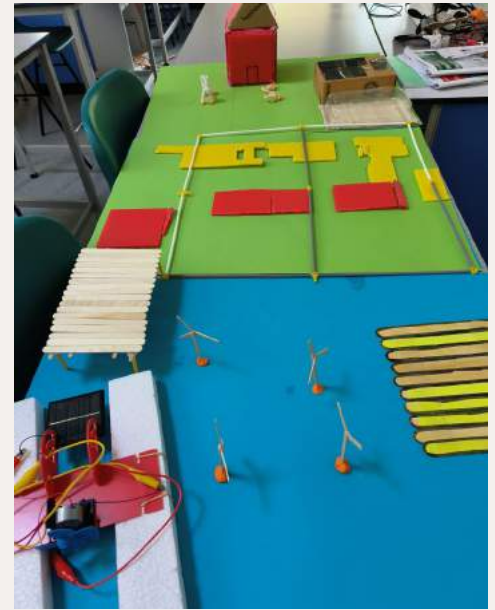
Practical STEM Projects – Teams work on a project surrounding a current STEM theme such as the environment, circular economy or the digital world, with the support of mentors from industry.

With regular team meetings - Students meet with their teacher's support to work on their project, assign tasks and keep track of progress.

Elowen Meek, Isabelle Davis, George Earl, Dominik Hajda, Dylan Garland and Fearon Ranson-Wright in Year 8 have successfully achieved their Industrial Cadet Bronze-level award.

They had to work as a team to solve a challenge which was "My School is an Island." For this, they had to imagine the school was located on an island and needed to be as sustainable as possible. They looked at growing their own food, building infrastructure, energy, transport and waste disposal. The students had to produce a report on what they had done and then present their findings to a panel of judges who asked them questions about their solutions.

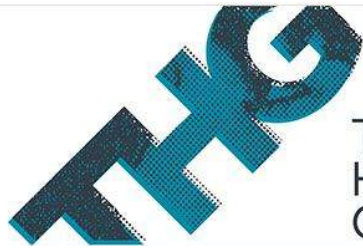
Cadets from Honiton participate in the 80th anniversary of D-Day commemoration event in Sidmouth.

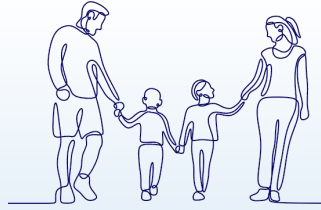
