Tales of Staff Travels

Mrs Jones interviewed by Amduscia Gregory (Language Leader, year 11)



Do you speak another language?

I am disappointed to say that I have not exercised the languages I learnt enough over the past few years. I studied French and Spanish at school, continuing with Spanish and doing well. More recently, with raising young children we have encouraged counting in other languages up the stairs. By 3 years old they could count up the stairs in German, French and Spanish. We have also been reading 'Peppa va al acuario' (Which is much harder than I thought it would be!) and 'Petit Ours Brun'. Children are like sponges with languages, and they certainly push you on when you realise how quickly they learn. I definitely feel I need to get my act together as they will overtake me very soon!

Have you ever lived abroad? How long for? Where?

I have only lived abroad for weeks or months at a time. I spent two months living in Kenya whilst volunteering. I had wanted to volunteer in Africa for many years and it was one of the most educational, emotional and inspiring experiences of my life. During my time there I taught some English in a school, completed Malaria surveys and handed out mosquito nets and supplies to a local village of mud huts, built a well, dug and built a basic toilet block and hand washing facilities, and constructed guttering to harvest rainwater for a local school. We also visited an orphanage and saw the challenges faced in extreme poverty. I could write so much about this experience. I kept a diary at the time and recorded the things I observed, felt and achieved. I still have the diary and I hope to continue it one day and make a difference to another community.

I spent a few months in Austria during a ski season where I was a chalet host for some skiers. It gave me an insight into the German language for a short while but serving tasty food to some wealthy Brits didn't culturally educate me the same as Africa did!

Do you often travel to other countries for holidays? If so, which ones?

I have travelled some of the East Coast of Australia, and Western Canada on 2-4 week road trips. I have been to Spain, France, Austria and Switzerland. I would like to explore much more of Europe, Asia and some more remote parts of the world. My brother has travelled much more than me and having heard his adventures and watching some documentaries on tv, I'd love to experience some remote cultures such as those in Mongolia.

What is your favourite foreign country and why?

Australia and Canada were beautiful countries for English speaking travelling. I don't think I have found my favourite foreign country yet... I think I need to experience some more once I have saved up enough money...

What is your favourite foreign food/drink?

I am quite a fan of Sangria and paella and when in Africa it was incredible to taste fresh Mango bought from a stall next to where it was picked. I would love to try more native dishes cooked in middle/eastern countries.

When on holiday abroad, do you make the effort to speak a few words in the language?

Absolutely! Even if I combine my languages and end up speaking to a French host in Spanish resulting in my other half regularly laughing at me when he remembers the occasion.

Do you feel this effort makes a difference?

I always think it is respectful to at least try, effort counts for a lot. However, I have realised that some nations are a little more helpful if they see that you are struggling!

Have you ever been surprised by a cultural difference?

I think I am always fascinated by cultural differences. What we think is normal or polite in our own country is irrelevant once you enter another country. I think that having to revaluate where you are and to adapt to other cultures is an amazing skill to learn. Taking a moment to pause, observe and to understand is a quality that will benefit you through life.

MFL READING TIPS

Top reading tips

- •Read each piece of text once, then read the questions and then read each piece of text again.
- •Read the questions carefully.
- •Read for specific details as well as main points in the different passages.
- •Use the introduction to the question to help you think about what particular words might mean.
- •Use cognates (words that are similar to English ones) or near cognates to help you work out the meaning of some words.
- •Use your knowledge of grammar to help you.
- •Make sure you know the different time markers to help you spot the different tenses.
- •Don't worry if you don't understand every word in the text. Concentrate on what you do understand.

MFL LISTENING TIPS

Top listening tips

- •Learn lots of vocabulary as this is the key to understanding as much as possible.
- •Listen for specific details as well as the main points.
- •You could listen for the main points the first time you hear the recording and then the specific details the second time you hear the recording.
- •If you're really stuck, think of cognates (words which are similar in English) and make a sensible guess.

Calligram: a word, sentence or poem in which the design and layout of the letters creates a visual image related to the meaning of the words themselves.
Guillaume Apollinaire was a famous French poet who wrote a book of poems entirely made of calligrams.

Guillaume Apollinaire (26th August 1880 - 9th November 1918)

Calligrammes, collection of poetry by Guillaume Apollinaire, published in French in 1918. The poems in the collection reflect Apollinaire's experiences as a soldier during World War I as well as his association with the Parisian art world. The collection is especially noted for its pattern poetry, a verse form in which the words of a poem are arranged to form a pattern suggesting the subject of the poem.






Amazing benefits of learning a language
