Do you have any future trips planned, and where are you going?


Probably, Istanbul this summer but haven't started planning it yet.

In June 1944, Charles De Gaulle (head of French Resistance movement and exiled in London) spoke on Radio London to signal to the French Resistance fighters that they needed to blow up the railway tracks going towards Normandy so the Germans couldn't get there easily. He used the poem by Paul Verlaine (Les Sanglots longs des violons) which was a coded signal the Resistance Fighters had been waiting for. The first verse of the poem was read out on 4th June 1944 and the second on the 5th June 1944. The famous D-Day Normandy landing took place on 6th June 1944.

French Travel Tips

The French take their time. Life isn't all about rushing to fit as much into the day as possible so you may be caught off guard by the pace of life. The French work to live and not the other way around.

Learn a few key French phrases. Outside of the hospitality and tourism industries, the vast majority of French people do not speak English. No one expects tourists to speak conversational French but learning a few key phrases will go a long way toward respecting French norms and making a good first impression. Learn bonjour, merci, s'il vous plait, and au revoir and use them often. Don't stress about your pronunciation. The effort is what counts.

Say bonjour before anything else. This tip might be the most important! Keep bonjour on the tip of your tongue. This simple greeting is a magic word and it needs to be said before any interaction with another person. Don't just approach someone with your food order or just walk up to someone and ask a question. Say bonjour first.



























MFL French Flash Fiction writing tips

You want to leave some room for imagination on the reader's part. The plot should give just enough information for the readers to be able to fill in the blanks for themselves.

As with longer pieces of writing, you need a strong beginning, a middle, and an ending which surprises, satisfies, or shocks. Your characters must be as developed and relatable to the reader as they would if you were writing a 100,000 word novel, and your sense of place must be both tangible and believable.

There is no time for hanging around with an introduction or revving up. You must begin straight into the action. Flash fiction requires brevity. An author must convey the plot in a succinct manner and make every word count.

In longer works of fiction you'd describe a person's quirks and personality traits in more detail. In flash fiction you need to sum up their essence only, keeping to what is most pertinent to the plot.

The passion and care on show in each of the many performances was a testament to the hard work and talents of our students.


Well done to all who took part and to the Language Leaders for organising such a successful event.






