It aims to teach young people how to lead others through basic languages activities by working to develop their communication, organisation and motivational skills.

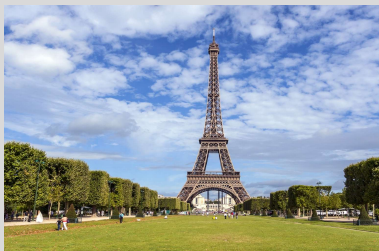

Students will also research cultural identity in the country of their chosen language and will have the opportunity to impart some of this knowledge during their lessons.
