French Fact: Le Réveillon

This is the name of the French Christmas Eve meal, which is a big and long feast. The name comes from the verb *réveiller*, to wake up or revive. Increasingly more families start this French Christmas tradition on Christmas Day, when it is easier for the whole family to gather together.

Food is a big part of French Christmas traditions. It depends on the region but some common French Christmas foods include:

•smoked salmon and oysters with bran bread and (real) butter

•foiegras (goose or duck liverpate)

•goose

•capon or turkey stuffed with chestnuts

•Servings of vegetables such as green beans cooked with garlic and butter and provincial herbs sautéed potatoes.

To finish the feast you will get the amazing looking and tasting *La bûche de Noël* (yule log), a sponge cake decorated like a yule log, traditionally made of chocolate and chestnuts.

Do you speak another language?

Then you'll have a good idea what teachers/ examiners are looking for. Make sure you can show off these skills in your own exam


Grammar can be one of the hardest things to learn and recall, as it can be so complex. You don't only have to know it, but you also need to understand how to apply it.

One of the best things for grammar is just to keep practising. Make posters, write the rules down on post-it notes and stick them around your room, or use flashcards.

Make sure you know all your tenses very well, especially if you are doing the higher tier!

In some cases, your marks will be capped if you don't use at least the past, present and future. The more tenses you use, and the better you know them, the more marks you will get for accuracy and content.

Your can't go wrong guide to learning vocabulary...



Colour code! By gender / tense / difficulty level / however you like!



Write a mnemonic to help you with difficult spellings. Running Helps Your Two Hips Move (RHYTHM)



Write your words on post-its and stick them up around your room.



Play word association or "last letter first letter"



Make flash cards – print out a blank table from Word and cut out the rectangles. Write the French on one side and the English on the other.



Break long words down into smaller parts to make them more manageable.
