# Tales of Teacher Travels 

Mr Kirkbride, Principal interviewed by Poppy Gryman (year 9)


Do you speak another language? No, it is literally one of my biggest regrets, alongside not ever learning to play the piano. I learnt a bit of Malay and Chinese/Mandarin, when I was younger. However, I'm not sure that I can remember any of it after so long. I can code in 3 programming languages though (not sure if they count as languages)!!

Do you speak another language at home?
No, although I work through my son's Spanish homework with him and dabble in Spanish and French when on holiday.

Have you ever lived abroad? How long for? Where?
My dad lives in Malaysia. I spent 3 months in Malaysia when I was around 20 and picked up a lot of Mandarin / Malay (I also had several other visits).

Do you often travel to other countries for holidays? If so, which ones? We try to have at least a week away each year (my wife also works in education, so term times are very busy for us as a family). Until this year, we have always visited Spain and France, it will be my first ever trip to Greece this year. Until the pandemic, we were making good use of our van, driving around both France and Spain. One of my favourite ever experiences had our accidental arrival to Beziers, at the time of their annual Feria de Béziers (we didn't look into the bull fighting but loved the way the community pulled together - such a diverse mix). It was enlightening, and such a different experience to anything I had ever been part of.

## When on holiday abroad, do you make the effort to speak a few words in the language? Does it make a difference to how you are treated?

$100 \%$. I still remember a lady laughing at my attempts at French in the Alps, so much so that she gave my two boys sweets after we had finished 'speaking'. I have similar examples of my times in Spain, but for some reason this one stuck with me (I was asking for a specific type of data cable). As humans, we all want to find common ground and ways to connect. Language is one of the most fundamental ways in which we can connect. By attempting a local language, I think that we make people feel valued and present ourselves as approachable.

## Have you ever been surprised by a cultural difference when travelling abroad?

Yes, I had many interesting experiences in Asia, as well as some of the experiences in France and Spain. There are too many to detail here but would be worth discussing.

## What is your favourite foreign country and why?

Easy. Spain, the people. I've never come across so many welcoming, warm and interesting people. My times in France, Italy, Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia and Germany have all been great, but I have an affection for Spain and its people which I think would be difficult to beat.

## What is your favourite foreign food/drink?

Beziers steak and chips was unreal. Not sure I will ever have a better meal. I had a glass of Elderflower and Mint in a random café in the foot of the Alps, definitely the best drink l've ever had.

## If you could live in any country, what would it be?

This one is a bit of a boring response. I would choose Great Britain/UK. I love where I live (Devon), being able to travel to The Lakes, Highlands, Cornish beaches and the Houses of Parliament is something that most people on the planet would die for. However, it is only special, in part, because we are lucky enough to be able to travel to amazing places on the continent, and beyond.

## Why Learn a

 Language?It improves your memory. The more you use your brain to learn new skills, the more your brain's functions work. Learning a new language pushes your brain to get familiar with new grammar and vocabulary rules. It allows you to train your memory to remember new words, make connections between them, and use them in contextual situations.

## Resource of the month

Duolingo. This game-like app teaches languages in a very playful and challenging way and is based on many visual as well as audio effects which are helpful to remember what you have learned. Another plus is that Duolingo varies the types of tasks and builds up every lesson in other ways which means more variety for the student.

Lack of integration is a real problem for many countries and more often than not it is due to the language barrier. Learning another language opens up the opportunity to be part of a community with a different culture.

- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation
- use language skills for communication in the real world, for practical purposes, for their immediate needs, interest and beyond and to express and justify opinions
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt
- discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied.
- develop their confidence and autonomy to access new and unfamiliar language through use of decoding skills brought about by the teaching of phonics and sound patterns
- work towards becoming a fluent and spontaneous speaker of the foreign language



## Information for parents

## How can I best support my child in French?

Helping your child effectively doesn't mean having to know French. It means implementing routines and habits that will help your child tackle homework, study effectively, and succeed academically.


1. Take an interest in what your child is doing and show that you value what they are learning.
2. Provide a regular study time away from television and other electronic distractions.
3. Give guidance, but not answers. Test your child on new vocabulary and then ask your child to self- assess to find out which words need further revision. Remind your child to proof read and double check written work multiple times for correct spelling, accents and word order. Encourage pattern spotting.
4. Celebrate success by pointing out that it came from hard work (anyone can work hard), not from intelligence (reserved for the fortunate few).
5. Work along with your child, whether it is by reading something for work, or by catching up on your emailshaving a parent close by makes homework feel less like punishment and more like a team effort.
6. Have them teach you something. Ask them to translate words, instructions or directions for you. What does this question mean? Being able to have a skill that their parent doesn't is a major boost for students, helping them tap into their motivation.

## What are the expectations of my child in French?



The course is 4 hours a fortnight for KS3 and 5 hours a fortnight for KS4.
Homework is set frequently. Homework will often focus on learning vocabulary or grammar, and it is important that students see this as essential homework. It may also be a written or comprehension activity. Students must also spend time each week practising speaking French and answering French questions covered in class. This will play a big part in success at GCSE as it is a key component of GCSE revision.
Students' written work is marked carefully ensuring that appropriate feedback is provided with the purpose of enabling the student to improve their work and their understanding of the subject. We purposely identify the type of error rather than simply writing in the correction.
