It's easy to get caught up in the sights, but don't let anyone approach you trying to get you to sign a petition, put a bracelet on your wrist, or give you a ring they "found" on the ground. They're all scams!

Also, never leave your cell phone on a cafe or restaurant table even if it's just a few inches away from your hand.

Thieves are fast and are masters at distracting you so they can grab your phone in the blink of an eye!

Get out of big cities.

If your schedule allows for it, get out of Paris and other big cities to experience the countryside and smaller towns.


Cultural Stereotypes-Germany





Has a positive effect on intellectual growth and enriches and enhances a child's mental development.




A bilingual brain is nimbler, quicker and more able to deal with ambiguities or resolve conflicts.

Learning a new language helps you to understand other people from other parts of the world.


There are lots of wonderful people in this world who don't just live in England.
