We are delighted that 3 of our Year 12 students were accepted onto the Bath University Programme. Gareth, Luke and Tom have weekly online tutorials with both lecturers and 3rd year undergraduates gaining both subject knowledge and valuable insight into Higher Education.

As part of the Careers Programme all of the Year 12s will be visiting Bath University for a residential programme in July to allow them to experience life as a student in one of the country's top ranking universities.



CAREERS FOCUS WEEK



On the 13th March we successfully ran our first Careers Focus Week. During this week students had the opportunity to ask careers focussed questions through our student leaders and our anonymous careers box.



These questions were answered by our Careers Southwest contact, Kate, and fed back to students in the Friday personal development session. All silent 'do now' tasks in KS3/4 lessons were adapted to be centred around careers and included information on



apprenticeships, college, university, post-16 provision, entry requirements and myths and truths about jobs. These tasks varied from videos to two truths and a lie and matching activities. Our assembly program for the week included external visitors from the RAF and the Navy to provide valuable advice for students. The Friday personal development session was in the form of a quiz and gave students an insight into other careers that members of staff had previously done to highlight that the average person will have 4 careers in their lifetime. The aim of the week was to get students thinking about careers and next steps and to open discussions to deal with misconceptions around qualifications, jobs and higher education. We look forward to our next careers focus week in April.

English Literature Revision Sessions

On Tuesday 21st March at 3pm, thirty eager Year 11s arrived in The Hub for an hour of English Literature revision. This was the third in a series of revision sessions led by the English Team: the first focussed on 'Macbeth'; the second, 'A Christmas Carol'; and the third, 'Lord of the Flies'. **Tuesday, 28 March,** there will be a return to 'Macbeth', with an analysis of Shakespeare's presentation of women.

In each of the sessions we have been hugely impressed by our Year 11 students. They have shown commitment, enthusiasm and stamina. After a full day of learning, rather than go home, so many have chosen to stay in school and have arrived at The Hub ready to take their revision further.


Here are a couple of comments from our students:





On Thursday 16th March 2023, Mr Skelding, Mr Leach & Mr Lane took 44 Year 10 Sport Science students to the University of Bath (Department of Sport Development and Recreation) where the students experienced a Sports Performer day. The students experienced a full day consisting of a tour of the top-level facilities, team building activities, fitness testing and time in the laboratory to perform their very own sports science experiment!

When we were in the lab, we had 6 volunteers who all performed fitness tests including the VO2 MAX treadmill test which involved running at increasing speed and then incline until fatigued. During this test, the students' heart rate, breathing rate and blood lactate levels were measured through the HR monitors and face masks that they ran in. The second lab test was the Wingate test which is a 30-second maximal effort on an exercise bike. This is to measure maximal power. The timing of the trip was perfect as they are about to start a piece of coursework which involves testing fitness and writing individual programmes to improve performance.

During the field events, all the students performed a 30-metre speed and acceleration test, a hand grip test, jump test, sit and

reach test and the standing long jump. The students enjoyed the opportunity to push themselves and one or two became very competitive!

During the day we were very well looked after by the university staff, many of which were students themselves. Several of our HCC students mentioned how inspiring the facilities at Bath University were and how, for some, this confirmed that they wish to attend university in the future. All staff were incredibly proud of our students who conducted themselves impeccably all day and really made the most of the opportunity, well done all.

We had to leave our house at 1:30am in order to get to Torquay's pitch by 2:00am. We travelled by coach and had a great driver called Dez , he let us listen to music. We arrived at Dover around 9:00am and it felt like a long time getting through security to have our passports stamped and then on to the ferry. I can remember him saying "You need to fly." Shortly after we had lunch, which was lovely, and then went back out for another hour's session. This time we were with Tim, and we played a variety of games. It was a great day of training despite being incredibly hot!

The next two days were similar and involved a good deal of football. We returned to the training ground each day and played a variety of matches. We even played against a Dutch girls' team and beat them 14-1! I enjoyed the game and managed to get two assists.


