The actual day started with a live BBC Devon Radio interview and then began the challenge of students and staff cycling continuously for 24-hours in a route that started in Honiton, travelled to London; quick hop across the channel to Paris and then back home. Our hourly raffle draw helped us to keep time and thank-you to many of our local businesses who donated some fabulous prizes. The total currently raised with money still coming in is £8387.61


A wonderful cast of 8 talented Year 9 and 10 students gave a magnificent performance of

Originally, this play was written in collaboration with neuroscientists to be adapted and performed by teenagers using their own personal experiences and as a result, inspire adults to rethink how they understand and interact with them.

Combining scientific facts, comedy, and the relatable, but sometimes brutally honest personal experiences of the young people involved. This play captures what it means to be a teenager and explores the complex relationships with parents /carers, while educating the audience about the role the teenage brain plays in causing this.

A combination of script and powerful original work, the majority of this play has been bravely written, produced and directed by the cast themselves.

This means they haven't just taken on the role of performers - but have also become playwrights and directors of this innovative production aimed at young people, parents/carers, and anyone else who has ever wondered why teenagers act the way they do.

Post-16 Computing business visit – Recycling and Distribution





As part of the Level-3 IT course our Year 13 students are building websites to showcase how Mid Devon District Council could improve their residents' rates of recycling by improving the way information is presented on their recycling website. As part of their preparation, a site visit was arranged to the operational centre in Willand. Our students had a briefing from Simon Bruford, the Waste & Transport Manager, and had a tour of the site to see how Mid Devon collects recycling and residual waste for 33,000 homes every week!


Simon talked about how IT helps plan efficient routes for the refuse trucks, reducing their CO2 output and also discussed planned IT improvements for further to improve customer experience. The biggest challenge faced is improving household recycling habits as still a large percentage of households don't sort all their recycling. Hopefully our IT students can showcase a website that could help lead the way.

We were also fortunate enough to have been offered a site visit to Pencarrie in Willand. They aim is to, "Be the most trusted and celebrated business in the wholesale garment and accessory industry."



They ship 700,000 garments a day across the UK and Europe with computer systems being an essential part of their operation. Our students were kindly provided with lunch and then briefed by lead developers (Ben and Trevor) and given an overview of the "Stack" that allows the operation to run and track all the customer orders and stock.






After the briefing, Warehouse Manager, Gareth Wicks, gave the students a tour of the site and the logistic operations. We were all surprised at the shear scale of the operations. Conveyor belts wound their way around the site, moving stock for selecting and packaging. The vast warehouses full of shelving were 4 meters high with endless rows of boxes. All tracked by cutting edge IT systems. A real privilege for our students to see how IT systems support such a successful and value driven company.

The University of Plymouth Science and Engineering Showcase


Snails, stick insects and a robot pet dog were just some of the things we experienced on our Year 10 student's trip to Plymouth University's Technology Showcase.

On Monday 4th March 2024, Mr. Taylor, Mrs. Salter and Mr. Lane took 36 Year 10 Sport Science students to the University of Bath (Department of Sport Development and Recreation) where the students experienced a Sports Performer Day. The students experienced a full day consisting of a tour of the top-level facilities, team building activities, fitness testing and time in the laboratory to perform their very own sports science experiment!

When in the lab, we had 3 volunteers who all performed fitness tests including the treadmill test which involved running at increasing speed and then incline until fatigued. During this test, the students heart rate, oxygen and carbon dioxide levels were measured through the HR monitors and face masks that they ran in.

The second lab test was testing maximal strength and power. The timing of the trip was perfect as they are about to start a piece of coursework which involves testing fitness and writing individual programmes to improve performance.







During the field events, all the students performed a 20-metre speed and acceleration test, a hand grip test, jump test, back/leg strength test, sit and reach test and the standing long jump.

Throughout the day we were very well looked after by the university staff, many of which were students themselves. Several of our HCC students mentioned how inspiring the facilities at Bath University were and how, for some, this confirmed that they wish to attend university in the future. All staff were incredibly proud of our students who conducted themselves impeccably all day and really made the most of the opportunity, well done all.








A Great Experience for our Year 12 Geography Students.

Lessons from Auschwitz





The project is open to students aged 16-18 years, and in Post-16 education, per school/college. Students can be studying any subject and can be from any ethnic, religious, social, economic or cultural background.





On Wednesday 6th March, as part of the Lessons from Auschwitz programme from the Holocaust Educational Trust, we went to visit the concentration camp Auschwitz-Birkenau in Poland. We got up very early in the morning and flew to Krakow, then drove to Oświęcim, the Polish name for the town of Auschwitz. Here, we had a look at some of the traditional town buildings, and the site of the Jewish Great Synagogue (which was destroyed by the Nazis in the war) so that we could understand the bustling community that existed before it became a concentration camp.

Then, we visited Auschwitz I (the first, original camp in the area), and looked around the different blocks of the camp. We walked through the iconic gate, stating "Arbeit macht frei" - work makes free, and into some of the different barracks. We looked at an example of the cramped, dirty living conditions of the inmates, photographs of some of the early prisoners, and the many items stolen from the Jews who were imprisoned there, such as shoes, bowls, bags, and even women's hair. We also looked at the book of names, which lists the 4.2 million names of the victims of the Holocaust. It was immense and it made the extent of the Holocaust even more real and horrific. . We walked past the Commandant (leader of the camp), Rudolph Hess's large house, and it seemed bizarre that family life could exist so close to where the prisoners were kept, as Hess brought his wife and children to live at the camp.

Finally, we went into the original gas chamber and attached crematorium. It felt creepy and upsetting, to think that so many people had been murdered were we stood, yet it was incredibly moving too.



Lessons from Auschwitz

After this, we visited Auschwitz II, otherwise known as Birkenau, which was more typical of what we expected the camp to be like. It was very open and exposed to the elements. We were immediately struck by its vastness: the camp covering approximately 400 acres. We couldn't see the end of the barbed wire fence bordering the edge of the camp. We walked through the iconic red brick tower entrance, where trains of prisoners would arrive directly at the camp. We looked in some of the preserved wooden huts where the prisoners would've stayed. They were dirty, and ridiculously cramped, often 7or 8 people would have to share one bunk of a bed, and disease was rife.





We also heard about the Jews small attempts at resistance in these camps, such as by continuing to pray, sharing food recipes, and planning ways of resisting whilst cleaning out the latrines. We walked down to where the 3 main gas chambers and crematoriums had been. They were left in ruins, as the Nazis had blown them up to destroy the evidence of what they had done as they retreated towards the end of the war. It was still very difficult to get our heads around how so many people had been murdered where we were. Then, as it got dark, we held a short memorial service, reading testimonies and poems from prisoners and listening to a Rabbi as he sung a hymn in Hebrew. We all lit candles and put them on the memorial plagues. It was incredibly moving, and, although it was cold, it felt really special that we were able to commemorate, remember and celebrate the lives of the 6.6 million who were killed in the Holocaust.

It was a very emotional experience, but it was also really interesting, moving, and inspirational. We feel honoured that we were able to undertake in this experience and remember the lives of too many who were lost.
